Small Games of Chance Referendum - May 20, 2003

Earlier this year the Board of Supervisors passed a Resolution to place a Referendum on the May Primary ballot that reads, "Do you favor the issuance of a license to conduct Small Games of Chance in the Township of Hanover, Northampton County, Pennsylvania?"

Regulation of Small Games of Chance is found in 10 P.S. §311 of the Pennsylvania Statutes. The Act allows the playing of Small Games of Chance for the purpose of raising funds, by civic nonprofit associations and for the promotion of charitable or specific purposes. Eligible organizations must obtain a license pursuant to the Act in order to conduct Games of Chance for the purpose of raising funds for public interest purposes.

Eligible Organizations include "qualifying nonprofit charitable, religious, fraternal and veterans organizations, clubs and civic and service associations as defined under the Act." In order to qualify as an eligible organization for purposes of the Act, the organization shall have been in existence and fulfilling its purpose one year prior to the date of the application for license.

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Emergency Management Plan

We are all familiar with the excellent response from the Hanover Township Volunteer Fire Department and Colonial Regional Police Department to an isolated emergency such as a structure fire, medical emergency or automobile accident.

But are we prepared for a more widespread disaster or emergency whether the source is from nature or man? The answer is yes. Hanover Township does have an official Emergency Operations Plan as required by Pennsylvania law. This plan is under the auspices of Mr. Francis Almer, the Township's Emergency Management Director and it specifies the procedures, actions and assignment of responsibilities to be taken during a pending or actual emergency or disaster.

The plan is very specific about the chain of command and who controls the operation. If the emergency or disaster is located entirely within the township, the township's Emergency Management Agency will exercise control of the

situation. If the emergency spans more than one township, then the Northampton County Emergency Management Agency assumes control, and if the emergency spans more than one county, Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency takes control of the operation. There are exceptions to these rules depending on the services needed.

In any case, to successfully deal with any emergency, an adequate number of personnel trained in the correct disciplines for the particular type of emergency or disaster that has occurred are required. The Hanover Township Volunteer Fire Department in addition to its own staff of volunteers has access to the resources from any of the agencies mentioned above as well as aid from some of our neighboring Townships through mutual aid agreements. However, since most of the responders are volunteers, there is some concern about having adequate staffing at times, particularly during the daytime hours on weekdays according to Bob VanWhy, the Township's Fire Marshal. If you are interested in serving your community as a volunteer firefighter or EMT please contact the fire company. Also, as a reminder, to report any emergency, dial 911.

WHAT IS WRONG WITH THIS PICTURE?

This tree has been "topped" and is an example of an illegal pruning method for trees in the Township right-of-way, along the street or in a planting easement. Topping is extremely detrimental to the health and longevity of a tree and should never be practiced on any tree. Topping severely stresses the tree and a certified arborist would never do this. What's left of the tree sprouts quickly, but

the new growth is narrow, weak branches. Because the cuts are made incorrectly, topping opens up the tree for decay and insects and ultimately kills the tree. A tree care brochure showing the proper way to prune is available free in the Township office.

Reminder #1: You must have permission from the Shade Tree Advisory Commission and a permit to remove a tree by the street or in a planting easement. All trees removed (dead or alive) must be replaced with a tree from the Township's Approved Tree List (available in the office).

Reminder #2: Mulch your trees to a depth of 3 inches in a minimum diameter of 3 feet. Do not let the mulch touch the trunk. Mulching protects the trunk from lawn mower damage and conserves water during dry spells. This is one of the best things you can do for your trees.

Plan to **pump up** heart knowledge

Hanover Twp. will offer summer activities to improve health.

Hanover Township in Northampton County will be kicking off a "hearty" program this summer.

The Hearts N' Parks initiative, modeled after a national program, will include a host of activities aimed to promote the healthy eating and exercise habits among children, adults and senior citizens.

"This program is aimed to include all segments of Hanover's population," said Cathy Heimsoth, township director of recreation. "This could range from a kickball game to lap swimming. But what all the activities will have in common is that they promote a heart-healthy lifestyle."

Heimsoth said the township would kick off the program at Family Fun Day on May 24. Organizers will pass out questionnaires to residents, testing their knowledge of heart health. At the end of the summer long program, the participants will retake the tests so organizers can gauge how successful the program was in promoting awareness.

In between the two tests, the township will run various activities to get residents' heart rates up or to snack on healthy treats.

For example, children will learn how to take their heart rate after exercising. The pool will be reserved at certain times for lap swimming, and a chart will be created so residents can log their distance over the summer. Older adults will have designated times for walking and water exercises.

Heimsoth said the Lehigh Valley Hospital is supporting the program by offering health information.

About 300,000 Americans die each year from causes associated with obesity, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. About 400,000 Americans die of illnesses related to cigarette smoking.

In 1999, an estimated 61 percent of adults and 13 percent of children and adolescents were overweight, the department reported.

While Hanover has organized programs to raise health awareness in the past, this will be the township's longest organized drive. The program is planned to span the summer, but Heimsoth hopes it will continue, in some form, long after the leaves change color.

Hanover is among about a hundred communities across the nation that are participating in the program, supported by the National Recreation and Park Association and the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute. At least one other Pennsylvania community, Erie, has launched the program.

The program began in 1999 as a pilot at a dozen sites in North Carolina, said Kristin Franco, a coordinator at the National Recreation and Parks Association in Washington, D.C.

New Law Designed to Save Highway Workers' Lives

As I prepare this column for the Hanoverview, Pennsylvanians are finally enjoying a sustained period of spring like weather. As a result, the highway construction season is upon us. Deaths and injuries among highway workers and others in construction work zones on U.S. highways represent a growing problem, according to the Federal Highway Administration. In 2000, there were an estimated 1,093 fatalities in work zones around the country.

It is important to do whatever we can to protect our highway and construction workers. A number of safety measures for those who work and travel on Pennsylvania highways are now law. Under a new law, motorists are now required to turn on their headlights when traveling through active highway work zones. To alert motorists, the work zones will be clearly signed. The objective is for road workers to better see oncoming vehicles.

The law is a secondary offense, meaning that a driver must be stopped for another violation in order to be cited for it. Failing to turn on headlights in an active work zone is punishable by a fine of up to \$25 when signs are in place. By turning on headlights motorists can prevent tragic deaths, show support for work zone safety and help save lives.

In addition, the law provides tougher penalties for persons who kill any person in an active work zone when recklessness or negligence is proven. The new law also institutes a 15-day driver's license suspension for those caught traveling 11 mph or more over the speed limit in an active work zone.

During April National Work Zone Safety Week was marked. The focus of this annual campaign is to increase driver awareness in work zones, thereby improving safety for both motorists and highway workers. When we approach a highway work zone, we owe it to those workers and their families to drive with caution 365 days a year.


Information provided on the website are current statistics of incidents occurring in each municipality, future Kid Card Programs, K-9 Demonstrations and Vacation House Check Forms.







Unless you are keeping track at home, all the recent talk about the state budget may seem a bit confusing. Governor Ed Rendell unveiled one budget on March 4th and the General Assembly passed it in record time. Then, the Governor signed the budget into law on March 20, after he line item vetoed much of the education funding contained in it.

The ink was barely dry on that budget before Governor brought out another budget with tax increases and slot machines on March 25. As a result, the Appropriations Committee held a series of budget hearings ... on both budgets!

So, what does this all mean?

Let's start with House Bill 648. HB 648 was the budget as proposed by Governor Rendell on March 4. It reflected his priorities for gathering revenues and making expenditures. While the General Assembly certainly did not support every line item in this budget, we believed that quick passage of this stopgap budget would provide the Administration and Legislature more time to look at new options without facing the June 30 Constitutional deadline to have a budget in place.

After the Senate passed the bill on March 12, Governor Rendell had 10 days to act. There was much speculation in the media as to whether he would veto HB 648, line item veto parts of the bill before signing it, or simply let the 10 days pass without acting, which would effectively enact it.

On March 20, the Governor elected sign the budget into law. However, he line item vetoed a few components of the budget -- most importantly the basic education subsidies that Pennsylvania provides to local school districts.

That brought us to March 25, when Governor Rendell addressed a joint session of the General Assembly to announce a plan to use \$2 billion in borrowing and \$2.9 billion in increased taxes to reduce local property taxes and fund economic development and education programs.

Governor Rendell is proposing a 33 percent increase in Pennsylvania's Personal Income Tax rate from 2.8 percent to 3.75 percent, which if enacted would mark the largest permanent increase in the PIT rate. This increase would generate nearly \$2.25 billion, or about 77.5 percent of the new tax revenue proposed under the Governor's plan.

The Governor's proposal includes a 212 percent increase in the state's beer tax, from 8 cents to 25 cents per gallon (\$50 million) and the legalization of slot machines at

Pennsylvania's racetracks. Pennsylvania now has four tracks in existence, with one under construction in Erie. The Governor's proposal calls for a total of eight tracks -- the current number authorized in Pennsylvania.

It is also essential to note that Governor Rendell has not called for the restoration of the funding cuts included in his March 4 budget, despite the additional revenue derived from his proposed tax increases and expansion of gambling.

The Governor's proposal calls for \$1.5 billion to be used for a shift in local wage and property taxes, including \$220 million for a reduction in Philadelphia's wage tax: 0.5 percent for city residents and 0.4 for non-residents. Under the tax shift, the

average property tax reduction is estimated by the Governor to be 30 percent with all a minimum reduction of 15 percent.

As you may know, the Senate Appropriations Committee, on which I serve, held a series of 20 hearings on the state budgets -- the one already enacted as well as the proposals now before the General Assembly.

Contrary to some published reports, there was never any consideration given to canceling these hearings. These hearings provided an opportunity for the Appropriations Committee to hear cabinet secretaries and the administration detail their plans for the upcoming fiscal year. These hearings are especially important since several of these agencies are the ones most significantly affected by the proposals offered by the Governor in his March 25 address.

So, where do we go from here?

As we consider the Governor's proposals, it is incumbent upon the General Assembly to review them based upon three conditions: will these programs work; do the figures add up; and, are the taxpayers willing to pay the extra costs they carry?

The Governor's proposal gives us a lot of food for thought in the weeks ahead. I am confident that the General Assembly will give the Governor's proposals a full review and fair consideration.


MILLER MEMORIAL BLOOD CENTER REVISES WEB SITE


events held at the Center's fixed sites. Information on scholarship opportunities and the "My Blood Your Blood" educational program are also easily accessible.

STATE OF THE TOWNSHIP

I am happy to report that the State of the Township continues to be Excellent. During these difficult times when other governmental bodies have had to increase taxes or decrease services, the Township continues to maintain a stable tax rate and provide exceptional services.

Driving around the Township you will notice many projects that are underway. On the western front, Extended Stay America and WaWa's are moving along on Schoenersville Road. The second phase of the Lehigh Valley Corporate Center is taking shape and Bennigan's will be under construction this summer, with a fall opening planned. Construction should also start along Airport Road with the Northgate II project that will be built on the western side, near the intersection of Orchard Lane. A manufacturing facility will be relocating to the Township from an adjoining municipality.

In the center of the Township, the Brith Sholom Synagogue continues their expansion. In the southeast corner of that intersection, the town homes of Hanover Glen are beginning to take shape. Construction will start this summer on the southwest quadrant for Hanover Ridge, a single-family residential project. As a result of all these projects this intersection of Stoke Park and Jacksonville Roads will be greatly improved.

Moving east, Patriot Bank will be built along 512 at the intersection of Wegmans' Drive. It will be next to a new first class office building at the intersection of Stoke Park Road and Wegmans' Drive. An elderly housing facility (Traditions of Hanover) has been approved for the piece of land behind Wegmans' on Northgate Drive. This summer will also see the Storm Water Project work in the area of the former Aspen Inn along the Monocacy Creek.

Along the Northern Tier of the Township the Jandl Project will begin to take shape this summer. Single-family homes will be built northwest of the intersection of 512 and Hanoverville Road. Part of this project includes the widening and curbing of Hanoverville Road on the northern side, an improved intersection at Hanoverville and Jacksonville Roads and an improved intersection at Hanoverville and Airport Roads in East Allen Township.

My goals since being elected to the Board have been to make government easier to understand, involve more residents, bring government to the residents and promote the Township. Hand in hand with these goals, I want to maintain the tax rate and improve the quality of life for our residents, including expanding youth and adult programming at the Community Center. In the last issue of the 'Hanoverview' we discussed the fact that we live in Hanover, not Bethlehem. I want people to be proud of that fact and when some asks where you are from, you can proudly say Hanover. Hearts 'N' Parks

HANOVER TWP. — A recreation program scheduled to begin this summer is aiming for the hearts and minds of township residents — literally.



The township will join Hearts 'N' Parks, a national, community-based program that promotes the education and implementation of heart-healthy lifestyles. The program is designed to help reduce obesity and the risk of coronary heart disease among Americans.

"We will be utilizing pre- and post-testing to gauge what kind of affect the program will have on the community," said Cathy Heimsoth, the township's recreation director.

Lehigh Valley Hospital and Health Network will sponsor the program and provide \$1,000, health information and guest speakers to the township community center for use throughout the summer. "What we're doing is providing sponsorship dollars and the expertise of our staff," said Fran Derhammer, a project manager with the marketing and public affairs department of the hospital.

Heimsoth said every Wednesday the township will run recreation programs for children supporting heart-healthy habits. Participants can earn stickers and awards for participation. The programs will feature speakers and healthy snacks. They will also teach children to take their pulse after physical games like basketball or kickball, Heimsoth said. The community center's pool will hold extra adult and child lap time and have a chart where swimmers can keep track of how many laps they complete. "The important thing is that through our recreation program we are trying to reach a diverse population," Heimsoth said.

The township will host three programs this summer promoting heart health and knowledge for senior citizens. All programs will be free to the public. "The intent is that we will run the programs through the summer," Heimsoth said. "If we find it successful, we will continue it in the winter months." Hearts 'N' Parks is sponsored by the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute of the National Institutes of Health and the National Recreation and Park Association. The program began as a pilot initiative in North Carolina in 1999. "We all know that obesity in children and adults is on the rise," Heimsoth said. "Our kids every year are getting less active. We want to make sure our activities support a healthy lifestyle."

Heart disease is the leading cause of death in the United States, and obesity increases the risk of developing heart disease. Derhammer said a goal of Lehigh Valley Hospital and Health Network is to promote awareness of heart-healthy habits. The numbers of overweight children and adolescents, as well as obese adults in the United States have doubled over the past two decades, according to the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute.

"This is a fun way to educate our kids," Heimsoth said. "It's just another way we are reaching out to our community."

The Township upon agreement with the City of Bethlehem, has secured the use of the Bethlehem Compost Center, for Township residents on a permit basis.

Any Resident, who wishes to use the facility, must first secure a permit at a cost of

\$10.00 per year from the Township. Permits shall be secured before use. Permits will be available Monday through Friday between 8:00 AM and 3:30 PM. At the Township Office, 3630 Jacksonville Rd. Bethlehem, PA.

Permits are available at the Township and are for single resident use only. Proof of Identification required for use.

COMPOST CENTER TIPS:

- Finished compost as available is offered FREE to the public (both residents and non – residents in bunkers outside the gate.
- Do not leave material outside the gates.

- Plastic bags used to transport materials shall be taken home.
- Recycle your grass by using a mulching mower or by cutting your lawn frequently and leaving the grass on the lawn. This does not contribute to thatch and provides excellent lawn fertilizer.

ACCEPTED MATERIAL

Leaves – loose or in brown paper bags.

Small Brush – up to 4" diameter no longer than 6 feet.

Hedge Trimmings, garden plant residue.
